Five REasons for Having Memorial Services

Thus, when one has boarded the ship of the Vow of great compassion and sailed out on the vast ocean of light, the winds of perfect virtue blow softly and the waves of evil are transformed. The darkness of ignorance is immediately broken through, and quickly reaching the land of immeasurable light, one realizes great nirvana and acts in accord with the virtue of Samantabhadra. Let this be known.¹

THE GREAT SHIP OF THE VOW! Shinran Shōnin offers this stunning imagery to teach us that, at the moment of death, a person who entrusts completely in the Primal Vow of Amida Buddha will be carried by that Vow to birth in the Pure Land. And instantly that person will realize enlightenment and thereupon return to this *saha* world as a bodhisattva to save other beings.

Shinran Shōnin's awakening led him to have a very unique attitude about death. While most people are afraid of death or mourn the loss of their loved ones, he found the death of a true follower of the nembutsu to be a <u>happy</u> occasion. Why shouldn't one rejoice over the fact that a Dharma friend has attained enlightenment and now represents a salvific presence in one's life?

This is the wondrous teaching of Jōdo Shinshū. But, doesn't it raise an interesting question for all of us? If we know that a friend or loved one truly entrusted in the Vow, then why should we conduct funeral or memorial services for him or her? In ancient times there was a belief that, when a person died, that person's family was required to carry out death rituals for the sake of that person. In particular, it was believed that the deceased's next rebirth would not be settled for 49 days. During that period the family had to conduct services in order to generate merit, which they would then direct to their loved one in order to bring about a better rebirth.

Some Buddhist traditions still hold to this belief today. But, Jōdo Shinshū does not. If we know that a loved one was a true nembutsu follower, there is <u>nothing that we need to do</u> on that person's behalf. There is no reason to try to generate merit for him or her. And yet, don't we still conduct funeral or memorial services when a loved one dies? And don't many of us still have 49th day services, first-year services, and so on? But, why?

In Jōdo Shinshū, we do not conduct services for the sake of the person who has died. Rather, funerals and memorial services are held for the sake of the living. There are, I believe, at least *Five REasons* for having such services, which are opportunities for us to:

REmember. We have the opportunity to recall the life of the deceased, thereby appreciating that the value and meaning of that person's life continue to exist in our own lives.

REceive. Through our remembrances, we find that we are better able to hear the Dharma and encounter the working of the Buddha's wisdom and compassion today.

REflect. We find that we are able to take stock in our own lives, based on a renewed understanding of where we have come from, where we are now, and where we are going.

REconnect. Through this process we are able to reestablish relations with our family, friends, our temple, our faith, all other beings, and ourselves.

REfresh. We are able to gain a renewed sense of appreciation and enthusiasm for all that life continues to offer us. And we get to share a great meal with friends and family!

At memorial services, we are not the ones trying to do something on behalf of the deceased. In fact, it is the other way around. By drawing us together within the supportive embrace of our family, our temple and our Dharma, our deceased loved ones become our bodhisattvas, calling us to take refuge in Amida's Vow.

Matthew Hamasaki is attending Ryukoku University for one year as an exchange student. This is his third message dated July 14, 2014:



Hi Everyone,

It's still raining a lot, and I have to admit, sometimes I welcome it because it means a temporary relief from the hot weather. It doesn't get as bad here as other parts of Japan, though. There was a typhoon which came through Okinawa and we were worried that it may come through Kyoto but it had dissipated to a regular rainstorm by the time it got more inland. However, the constant rain here means that it is extremely humid. It feels extreme to me, at least, because I am not used to this weather at all. I feel thirsty and tired all the time, and instead of feeling like I'm walking outside when I open the door it feels like I'm walking into a sauna.

Something that surprised me is how international the restaurant scene is in Japan! I thought that perhaps I may be stuck eating Japanese food every day since I was so lucky to have such a diverse selection in Berkeley. I'm happy to say I was quite wrong. For instance, Italian restaurants are very popular. I also seem to find a lot by accident as I stumbled upon an Indian restaurant, while I was looking for a Mexican restaurant I found a Spanish one, and when I was looking for a Bakery/Diner I found a boulanger/French restaurant. And I felt at home when I managed to find a cheap Chinese restaurant.

I'm getting a little more comfortable speaking in Japanese to Japanese people although there are still a lot of words I do not understand as they speak very fast. As difficult as it is to do something new, I did do an activity which was very familiar to me since childhood, making onenju!

BERKELEY BUDDHIST TEMPLE Board of Directors Meeting June 10, 2014

Attendance: Rev. David Matsumoto, Takashi Nikaidoh, Judy Fujimoto, Patty Fujiwara, Lucy Hamai, Don Hamasaki, Emiko Katsumoto, Kiyoshi Katsumoto, Judy Kono, Dii Lewis, Millie Nikaidoh, Emi Nakao, Art Nishimura, Gary Oda, Yuki Otake, Wayne Sugihara, David Ushijima, Russell Ware. Proxies: Denise Lapidus, Lena Yin.

Co-president Takashi Nikaidoh called the meeting to order at 7:35PM with opening gassho led by Rev. Matsumoto.

MAY MINUTES will be sent by email tomorrow for approval.

MINISTER'S REPORT: Rev. Matsumoto presented a written report for the period 5/13/14 to 6/10/14 which included the following: 5 meetings; 2 consultations; 5 services; 2 preparations; study class in San Jose; 1 interview; bazaar and cleanup. Because of a large projected response for the Summer Pacific Seminar, activities will be held at our temple, and July/August tobans are requested to assist. There will be a Sunday closing service on July 6; thus the Shotsuki service will be held later at 1:30 pm. Shotsuki families will be notified via letters, Padma, and robocall. The BBT MA program will be expanded to include two new persons, and two more have offered to provide occasional assistance. The BDMA is planning a free district-wide practical educational program for members of all BD temples on Saturday, November 8 at the San Mateo BT.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Satoshi Steimetz issued a written income/expense report for 5/1/14 to 5/31/14. Kiyoshi provided a Details of Maintenance costs from January to April 2014 so that the board could review cost patterns thus far. Our monthly costs seem to be in an appropriate range.

BAZAAR FINANCIAL REPORT was presented by co-chair Russell Ware as provided by George Yin. He will provide comments made at the evaluation meeting to the board. More will be ordered for those food items that sold out early Sunday afternoon; e.g. steak. Russell and Sara Jotoku were thanked for chairing this year's successful bazaar.

CORRESPONDENCE: Co-president Takashi Nikaido circulated the correspondence binder. A question involving a donation from Silicon Valley/Chevron was discussed. Kiyoshi will follow up on this. Dr. Alfred Bloom sent a thank you note for the Centennial book.

REPORTS BY AFFILIATED ORGANIZATIONS

BBWA: Yuki Otake reported that BBWA members will visit the Colma cemetery where Rev. Matsumoto will conduct a brief memorial service for BCA ministers and bishops. Following this, members will visit the Alameda Temple bazaar for lunch. Caroline Fernandez attended the BDBWL meeting this past Sunday. In October the BDBWL will host four BWA members from Japan after they attend the FBWL conference in Los Angeles. Preparation for the BBWA Centennial continues, and volunteers are sought to help.

J-SEI – will hold its annual Family Festival on September 7 at the El Cerrito Community Center, but BBWA will not participate this year due to conflicting Centennial obligations.

DHARMA SCHOOL: Kinji Steimetz, our only high school graduate, was honored at the Graduation Service June 8. He announced that he will be attending USC.

JR. YBA: VP Noel McGuire issued a written report. BDJrYBA's annual volleyball tournament had over 100 participants. Emi Nakao won a raffle prize at this event. A Bay District JrYBA meeting was held at BBT June 7, and new officers at this level will include Noel McGuire as vice president and Toshi Steimetz as treasurer. There will be a summer BD activity at Great America. There will be no SLO retreat this year since BDJrYBA hosted the annual conference this year.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

RELIGIOUS COMMITTEE: Art Nishimura provided an updated 2014 service calendar report. The following adjustments were made: Dec. 21: temple cleanup; Nov. 30 – regular DFS; Nov. 9: Rev. Matsumoto will be the speaker for Esshinni/Kakushinni service; Sensei will check on the opening date for Dharma School.

PLEDGE/MEMBERSHIP: No report

BUILDING MAINTENANCE: No report

GARDEN MAINTENANCE: Gary Oda compiled a list of three possible gardeners to take over from the current gardening company. He also recommended that we contract with one of Dennis Makishima's students to trim our trees as needed. Gary and his handyman will work with Scott

Takeda to install a more effective drip-irrigation watering system for the front garden area. The board requested that Gary obtain bids from these three gardeners and work on the new watering system. He will report back to the board next month. The board reviewed, updated and simplified the to-do list provided by Scott.

APARTMENTS: No report

OTHER REPORTS

CHAPEL OF THE CHIMES NICHES: Gary gave an update. To date 64 of 100 niche placement rights have been sold. For the remaining unsold rights, the price has gone up but purchasers will receive a 20% discount. Urns can now be placed into the niches. Placement of names in the niche will be based on order of purchase. Gary was thanked for all his efforts in accomplishing this project.

SOUND SYSTEM: Dii is trying to scale down the scope to reduce the cost; e.g. we can cover just the hondo or hondo and social hall. Currently our system is unbalanced. The social hall components are very old. Upgrading this system in the hondo will allow us to make recordings more easily. Our current mounted camera has very limited use with the current components. Sensei advised that we need to think of different ways to propagate Buddhism, and the increased capability with this upgrade would allow us to provide video for shut-ins or via youtube. We will discuss this again next month.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH: After some discussion, Takashi requested more suggestions for the next meeting.

BOARD ELECTIONS coming up will need to replace or reinstate this set of directors: Jon Kawamoto, George Yin, Judy Kono, Emi Nakao, Wayne Sugihara, Takashi Nikaidoh, and David Ushijima.

BBT SCHOLARSHIP was presented to Kinji Steimetz at the Graduation Service, reported by chairman Wayne Sugihara.

NEW BUSINESS

DEMOLITION OF BBQ PITS – Dii Lewis reported that this will happen in August with his company donating labor, operators, and a truck driver. He will provide a more accurate cost estimate at the next meeting.

NICHI BEI BON ODORI ad will be taken care of by Kiyoshi as voted upon at the last meeting.

2014 BERKELEY ANNUAL GIFT was presented to the Women's Daytime Drop-in Center at their recent fundraiser by the gift committee: Yuki Otake and Pat . Lucy Hamai, Bob Matsueda and Ranko Yamada also attended this event.

Dii Lewis and Patty Fujiwara were thanked for the delicious refreshments. Next month: Dina Honda and Lena Yin. The meeting was adjourned at 9:33 PM with closing gassho led by Rev. Matsumoto.


